Worship, Doubt, and the Trinity
Matthew 28:16-20

Worship, doubt, and the Trinity — strange thoughts for a worship service you might think, right?
The odd one out is obviously doubt, isn't it?
Worship is one of the central activities of the faithful.
And the Trinity is an essential and distinguishing part of the Christian faith.
Clearly, the two go well together.
But doubt? How did doubt creep in there?
Today we are told,
When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. — Matthew 28:17
It's a bit of a disappointment.
This doubt mixed in there with worship and the Trinity offends us,
we want things to be sure and certain, black and white.
We want to get it right.
We think we want a world governed by a strict binary function
We think we want a world governed by a strict binary function, like basic computer code:
a one or a zero; either or; this or that; yes or no;
you have or you have not; she loves me, she loves me not;
you're in or you're out; a success or a failure;
you believe or you don't believe.

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And I agree, she does. But, maybe in my most vain moments I'm tempted to believe that if I had been there with Jesus on that mountaintop, then I might not have fallen prey to the confusion and doubt that affected the disciples. But maybe I'm dreaming! Living on earth, between heaven and hell is not easy. On every Sunday, in every place where we gather for a mountaintop experience with Jesus, it is very much a mixed-bag community of God's people who come together. Some of us are ready to worship. Some may be full of doubts. The mix changes from day to day and from Sunday to Sunday Depend on what has happened during our week. True, the hope is that in the course of the worship time, faith will win out over our doubts, but as we gather we are probably a real mixture. This worship-doubt dilemma isn't solved with a sudden download of all the faith and gifts necessary so we are immediately transformed into super-saints. Hah, as long as we are on this earth doubt will always be about in the shadows of our faith journey. The only way to deal with the shadow of doubt is the shining the light of Christ's presence with us through trust. Imagine, your kids have bought you a skydiving experience for your birthday. At first you think they're nuts Then you wonder what it would be like. You know that your ability the jump out of that plane depends on your trust in the parachute. Similarly, the success of obeying Jesus and going out on his mission to make disciples of all nations in the name of the Triune God does not depend on our strengths or abilities, but on our trust in the promise of Christ's powerful presence with us, even in the face of our doubts. And, our doubts are not a problem for God, as we see in today's gospel reading. When Jesus sees his doubting disciples he doesn't pull back and hold off. He doesn't say, "Okay, you guys are obviously not yet ready; come back when you've got some faith!" Jesus didn't give up on them, in spite of their doubts, even after they had seen all of the evidence of his resurrection. And he doesn't give up on us either!

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Hear these words of affirmation and promise from God's word
        attesting to God's desire to use us in his rescue mission of the world.
Paul says to the church at Corinth
        "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1
Corinthians 12:27).
In Christ we are a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:16);
        we are God's masterpieces, "
        created in Christ Jesus for good works" (Ephesians 2:10).
Peter, who so often swung between bold faith and doubt-filled fears,
        wrote that we are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's
own people,
in order that [we] may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called [us] out of
darkness
        into his marvellous light" (1 Peter 2:9).
This is all the work of the Triune God,
        whose grace is sufficient to deal with every fear that oppresses us,
        whose power is made perfect in our weaknesses
                And yes, even in our doubts!
The great commission of Matthew 28
        shows that our Triune God does not hold back from us.
Verb upon verb is piled up:
        go, disciple, baptize, teach, obey, and remember.
And the key is probably that last one: remember.
        The only way we ever overcome our doubts and fears
                is by remembering what is true and essential.
This week, I bought my granddaughter, Charlotte a bike.
        I remember teaching my own kids to ride.
Running behind them,
        Telling them not to panic, I was there behind them to hold them up.
When COVID-19 isolation hit
        And I became aware I had to do something I panicked.
                I didn't know anything about preaching in this environment.
It was only knowing that God was there behind me that held me up
        That stopped me panicking and giving up.
It is remembering the promise of Christ's powerful presence with us is what holds
us up.
        That memory is the only adequate antidote to the doubts that would infect
us.
The risen Christ is with us, always,
        and because all authority has been given to him,
                we can dare to go
and make disciples of all nations,
        baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy
Spirit,
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teaching them Christ's way of life.
That is our high calling, and there's no doubt about it!
Amen.
