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- <sup>10</sup> Jesus called the crowd to him and said, "Listen and understand. <sup>11</sup> What goes into someone's mouth does not defile them, but what comes out of their mouth, that is what defiles them."
- <sup>12</sup>Then the disciples came to him and asked, "Do you know that the Pharisees were offended when they heard this?"

# Listen and understand

# Matthew 15:(10-20), 21-28

We are in the middle of a pandemic lockdown.

but let's face it's so cold here in southern Australia none of us want to get out much anyway.

But our minds wander on what might be, plans.

we are thinking of what Christmas will look like, maybe our next holiday.

I know my wife is. She loves getting away.

Some people spend ages planning the perfect trip.

There is a travel company called Black Tomato.

the name should give you a hint.

The company offers "Get Lost" holidays.

It takes a certain amount of courage to take a trip to a surprise destination.

Most of us like to have a little more control when it comes to our travel plans.

Our reading today starts like this:

"Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon . . ."

Now, Tyre and Sidon were Gentile towns about 80 Kms away from Galilee,

and there's no explanation why Jesus why Jesus decided to go there

Apparently, the only obvious reason Jesus might have travelled to this challenging destination

was to minister to this desperate woman.

We're told

"Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon."

Matthew makes a point of saying that this was a Canaanite woman.

In Jesus' day, no observant Jew would speak with a woman outside his own family

and particularly not a Canaanite.

They were traditionally considered enemies of the Jewish people. (2)

At first, Jesus seems to snub her cries for help.

Matthew tells us that Jesus "did not answer her at all."

And the disciples were no help. They urged him saying,

"Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us."

Jesus answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel."

Still she doesn't give up.

She came and knelt before him. "Lord, help me!" she said.

And he replied with another crushing remark:

"It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs."

Now it's time for Jesus to be surprised.

"Yes it is, Lord," the Canaanite woman said.

"Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table."

This all seems like an un-Christ-like conversation for Christ to have that ends with Jesus commending the woman for her great faith!

There are only three people in the Bible who were specifically commended by Jesus for their great faith: a Roman officer who pleaded with Jesus to heal his servant, a woman who had been haemorrhaging blood for twelve years and touched the border of Jesus' robe in hopes of receiving healing, and this Canaanite woman who came to Jesus begging him to heal her demon-possessed daughter. The funny thing is that none of these three people had the right according to the Jewish law

to approach Jesus with a request for help.

They were separated from him by a huge wall of cultural and religious norms. By the Law, none of these 3 people had the right to bring their desperation to Jesus. But Jesus didn't reject them or correct them.

In fact, he commended each one of them for their great faith.

Desperation is a scary state of being.

Desperation can drive us to make unthinkably bad choices.

Some of us know what it's like to feel desperate,
just like the Roman officer and the bleeding woman
and the mother with the demon-possessed child.

We feel like we almost can't breathe.

There is a popular phrase "Desperate times call for desperate measures." I want to suggest to you that a more helpful phrase would be "Desperate times call for Jesus." That's what these faithful people believed.

This Bible passage about the Canaanite woman shows us that desperation doesn't disqualify you from having great faith.

Neither does your gender or social status.

All that's required is the willingness to bring your desperate need to Jesus.

This woman who wasn't from the Jewish faith addressed Jesus as Lord. The word she used refers to one who is Supreme or Master. How did she know, even when Jesus' own disciples weren't sure of his claims She knew that the power of life was in his hands. Somehow, she knew he was her only hope.

Anne Lamott, has said that her prayer every morning is, "Help me, help me, help me."
Her nightly prayer is "Thank you, thank you, thank you."
In between those two prayers, she says, is an occasional "WOW" prayer when she is suddenly aware of God's work in her daily life. (5)

Jesus walked a 180 kms round trip to Tyre and Sidon to minister to this Canaanite woman.

And Jesus walked in our shoes all the way to the cross

for no other reason than that he loves us.

He shared our weakness, our questions, our pain.

The night before his arrest Jesus prayed so desperately that he sweated drops of blood.

He understands what it is to be desperate.

He didn't come to wave a magic wand and take away all our troubles.

But he did come to show us that we are not alone.

His message and his ministry kept coming back to this one truth:

There is a God, and God loves you.

Desperate times call for Jesus.

What was the Canaanite mother's first request of Jesus?

"... have mercy on me."

She knew that mercy is an essential part of God's character.

And so even though she knew she had no right to approach Jesus,

she was counting on his mercy to meet her needs.

And even when Jesus was silent,

even when he tried to turn her away,

she knelt down at his feet.

Jesus complimented this Canaanite woman for her great faith.

Great faith is pretty simple, at least by Jesus' standards.

Bring your desperation to him and trust in God's love for you.

The God who gave up His power and majesty and ultimately His life to save us from the power of death

loves you too much to ever turn you away.

Desperate times don't always call for desperate measures, but desperate times always call for Jesus.

# Prayers for all people

Ask people to sit quietly and reflect on what they really want God to do in their lives. Invite them to imagine themselves as the Canaanite woman. Say: Do not give up praying till you feel a peace, that Jesus has heard you. Tell him that whatever the answer you will accept it humbly and gratefully. Say to him: 'Speak, Lord, for your servant hears you.'

Lord, the Pharisees were offended by your words.

You could have been offended by the Canaanite woman's words.

I ask that, as I go about my business, I will take the time to consider each person I

meet as unique, special to you, and worthy of my listening ear.

May I not be offended just because something is out of my comfort zone.

The Canaanite woman sought your help. She loved her daughter so much, she was so desperately in need, that she wouldn't give up till she had her answer.

We pray in faith.

Hear us and answer our cry, blessed Lord.

Lord, may we learn from this woman, to wait on you expectantly, patiently, persistently, doggedly. Grant us the courage of our convictions when we truly believe we are doing your will.

We pray in faith.

Hear us and answer our cry, blessed Lord.

We pray today for those who feel excluded, whatever their situation, whatever the reason: for prisoners, refugees, the homeless; for the sick, the mentally unstable; for any who feel that they are outsiders.

We pray in faith.

Hear us and answer our cry, blessed Lord.

We pray for ourselves when our faith is weak, or we feel that we don't belong. **We pray in faith.** 

Hear us and answer our cry, blessed Lord.

Amen.
