The Gospel reading is set in Holy Week, a day or two before the arrest of Jesus.

I know they're corny, but I love good news/bad news jokes.

A young man phones up his dad at work for a chat.

Dad says, "I'm sorry, son, but I'm up to my neck in work today"

Son says, "But I've got some good news and some bad news for you, Dad."

Dad says, "OK, but since I've got no time now, just give me the good news."

Son says, "Well, the air bag works . . ."vi

Or a gallery owner says to an artist, "I have some good news and some bad news."

The artist asks, "What's the good news?"

Gallery owner says, "The good news is that a woman came in here today asking if the price of your paintings would go up after you die.

When I told her they would, she bought every one of your paintings."

Artist says, "That's great! What's the bad news?"

Gallery owner says, "The bad news is that woman was your doctor!"vii

In our Bible passage today, Jesus had to deliver some terrible news to his disciples. But he didn't deliver it in the good news/bad news formula we're accustomed to.

Jesus told them the bad news first,

but then he told them the good news

that God had already planned to help them

persevere when events in the future became painful and

chaotic.

### Address

Image yourself as a child for a moment  
 a child from a reasonably normal, healthy and loving home.

There is a song that is familiar to all of us, a secular song.  
 It could be called an advent hymn -  
 although it doesn't talk about God,  
 or about the coming of Jesus,  
 or even about the Christian hope.

Does anyone not know Santa Clause is coming to town?

The song is loved by millions of people throughout the ages - especially by children.  
 It is a song that speaks about the coming of an important person,  
 a person who knows us and our every action,  
 a person who is good and loving and who expects us to be the same.

For a world no longer accustomed to reading the scriptures  
 the song summarizes the Advent message in a secular way  
 It's just that as Christians we substitute the name of Jesus  
 for the name of Santa Claus  
 If you listen carefully, in a secular way  
 this song tells us about the return of Christ  
 and how we should be ready for it.

So, it's the first Sunday, the first week, of Advent.  
 It's a time for Christians of waiting, watching and hoping:  
 hope like that expressed by Jeremiah during a time of persecution  
 hope that justice is coming;  
 hope like that in the story told by Luke  
 when Jesus uses the new shoots on a fig tree in spring  
 to describe the hope and joy of new beginnings;

Jesus starts by talking about the signs to come  
 of distress to be seen in the sun, moon and stars,  
 the roaring sea and the waves.

He noted that cosmic signs will precede the coming of the Son of Man  
 and will cause people to be terrified.

But he follows this with the signs of hope that could also be found – if one cared to look.  
 Jesus told of a fig tree.

He said that one can tell what is coming by watching the signs.  
 By looking at fig leaves sprouting in April,  
 they know that summer is near.

Similarly, when the Great Tribulation comes,  
people will know that the kingdom of God is near.

Being afraid is horrible.

I remember a time when a child fainted in A&E after breaking their arm,  
and how deeply afraid about what the consequences of having done that might be.  
I remember how grateful they were that they were forgiven for being sick over us,  
and reassured them that all would be well.

For many people, our world is a deeply frightening place.

Historically and shamefully,  
some preachers have played on this to frighten people  
into some form of coerced discipleship.

Today's Bible passages do not do this.

Rather they offer words of hope, safety and confidence  
to those who are deeply anxious.

It gives us a vision of the glory of Jesus' help.

But, I am unfortunately not familiar with fig trees.

Two friends were walking across a barren concrete wasteland.

One commented on a single blade of grass pushing through a tiny crack.  
Years later, they returned to the site and found the sea of concrete  
now covered in a carpet of grass.

For 21 months we have been in lockdown.

21 months of not knowing whether we would be locked down again or not.

21 months of either not wanting to be or not able to be in the company of others.

Even now, some are still anxious.

But we have lived through the winter of dark cold days.

We now appreciate the days getting longer.

In the Northern Hemisphere, they are approaching the darkest time of the year.

At the same time, today we light the first of our Advent candles  
a reminder that a light shines in the darkness  
and the darkness has not, and never will, overcome it.

And each Sunday of Advent we will light another candle,

and the light that holds so much promise  
will become stronger each week

culminating in the hope that is Christ's birth.

Jesus warned His disciples to be always ready.

Though a believer will be able to anticipate the coming of the kingdom by the signs,  
it is possible to get so entangled with the affairs of life

that some will not be ready for the kingdom when it comes  
unexpectedly (v. 34)  
and universally (v. 35)

and therefore, will not enter the kingdom.

It was against this wrong attitude that Jesus said,

Be careful (v. 34) and be always on the watch

But, as surely as summer follows winter.  
     in our dark days,  
 we wait and watch and hope  
     and our hope will not be in vain.  
 Jesus says so.
