# **GOSPEL**

Luke 3:1-6

**3** In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, <sup>2</sup> during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. <sup>3</sup> He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism repentance for the forgiveness of sins, <sup>4</sup> as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.

- <sup>5</sup> Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth;
- <sup>6</sup> and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.' " ii

Old Testament Baruch 5:1–9 or Malachi 3:1–4

Psalm Luke 1:68–79
New Testament Philippians 1:3–11
Gospel Luke 3:1–6<sup>iii</sup>

John the Baptist hears God's word and begins a ministry, baptizing people as a sign of repentance and telling those he meets that Jesus will be for all people. His work echoes the prophecy in Isaiah, that there will be a voice crying out to prepare the way of the Lord. Isaiah shows that Jesus' message is one of equality – not just for the rich and powerful and not just for the Jews.

Signs are important to us. They can tell us how to behave, where to go – and where not to go! A sign might tell us that the road ahead is bumpy, but probably not that it is smooth! But this week, we are going to see how Jesus is a sign for everyone that, regardless of who we are or what we do, we are all equal in the sight of God.

This week we explore John as a sign that Jesus is for all.

We long for your peace, O God.

Each Christmas is an important time in our year .... in our lives but sometimes we get our priorities wrong.

The second Sunday in Advent

leads to the seemingly increasingly rapid countdown to Christmas.

We can see it in the changes around us.

More and more Christmas decorations are popping up around the place; community carol singing events are happening; Christmas party season is in full swing.

And in today's readings,

we are reminded once more that

the Advent season is more than just preparing for and remembering the birth of Christ.

We are reminded that Advent is also about preparing ourselves for the second coming of Jesus and the fulfilment of the kingdom of God that comes with that.

We are in that time of waiting

that time between Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection and the full realisation of the Kingdom of God.

It is the resolution of the 'now but not yet' that is the kingdom of God, and the completion of the reconciliation of all things to God.

This time of waiting is a time of preparation, of getting ourselves ready in the 'now but not yet'.

John came out of the wilderness preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. He was the one preparing the way. John was calling those who heard him to repentance

to prepare the way for the coming of the Kingdom of God; to make a way for people to see and know the salvation of God.

John is calling all those who heard him to repent

to turn around – to have a dramatic change of mind and direction.

So, to repent is to turn away from the practices of the old age

from the world – the idolatry, violence, injustice, exploitation...

the broken world that we live in,

and turn towards the values and practices of the Kingdom of God

the love, the peace, the kindness, the justice, dignity, freedom, and abundance all that comes with a healed and reconciled world.

In our Advent preparations, we too are called to repent,

to turn away from the ways of this broken world,

and to turn back to God.

Far beyond putting up our Christmas trees and laying out our nativity sets,

today's Gospel reading reminds us of what our Advent preparations should include to prepare for the coming of Christ by confessing our sins,

and by repenting – by turning away from the ways of the world and turning back to God.

We are called to make our paths straight,

to change our lives and be open to Christ changing our lives as we prepare the way for the salvation of God

to be seen in and through us in the community around us so that those around us might know the love of God in their lives.

It's like that television show called Extreme Makeover

The family have endured incredible hardship

And friends and the tv crew send them off on a holiday.

When they return, their home,

and we assume their lives have been rebuilt.

John the Baptist wanted people to understand

that the coming of the Messiah would mean the coming of Extreme Makeover.

And that day is still to come—

- a day when the poor will no longer be oppressed,
- a day when the hungry will be fed,
- a day when the world will no longer take up arms,
- a day when children will no longer live in fear.

And you and I are called to participate in that makeover.

Are you willing to do your part?

Or are you satisfied to participate only in that part of Christmas

that feeds our desire for parties and presents and pleasant thoughts and cares little about the plight of our neighbours and our world?

If so, then the prophet says it is time to repent.

The King is coming.

Prepare, ye, the way of the Lord.

God has spoken to His people.
